Margaret Storey lives in Bluefields for eight months of the year. She works with SIFT's sponsored children and their families who know her as Miss Margaret.

Now into my fifth year of serving long-term in Bluefields, it feels as though I have two homes and two families. I continue to spend eight months in Nicaragua and four months back



home in Newcastle and I am so very comfortable in both countries, though it is always a wrench when I leave my children and grandchildren behind each year.

With 125 children being educated in Bluefields through our school sponsorship scheme, my time is never dull. It has its joys and sorrows, its proud moments, disappointments and frustrations – but it's never dull!



Many of our students live by the rubbish dump area and it is heart warming to see these young people being educated and doing so well. They would never have had the opportunity to go to school were it not for generous folk in England offering to sponsor them. At the moment we have 16 students studying for a degree in university and this year should see another 10 graduating from secondary school and applying for a place at university.

Much of my time is spent supporting the families of our students and doing a monthly check at the various schools to make sure they are attending. Sometimes they will come and ask me to help them with their English studies or to accompany them on a hospital appointment or visit to the dentist.

The women's craft group which I started three years ago has gone from strength to strength. Some of the women have now made their efforts into small businesses – all it took was a bit of encouragement and supplying the items to get them started.

People often ask me how long I intend to serve in Bluefields – my answer is "As long as God wants me to be there and gives me the strength to do so!"

Love from Ali

Whilst I was in Nicaragua in August I was privileged to be able to meet José Gaitán Vivas, one of SIFT's sponsored children. José is sixteen years old and lives with his mum, Bernada, and dad, Santos, in one of the poorest parts of the town of Bluefields on the east coast of Nicaragua.





He is the third youngest of eight children, having three brothers and four sisters. Having such a large family is difficult financially for José's parents. His dad is often unemployed and his mum suffers from diabetes and had a stroke last year which makes it difficult for her to work. Before it was relocated the town rubbish tip used to be very close to José's house and he could often be seen there looking for things which his family could use or make good to sell on in order to help his family make ends meet.

Despite his difficult background José starts the fourth year of secondary school at Verbo School in February and is one of the best students in his class. He is on the school's honour roll as a result of his excellent results. José has been sponsored by SIFT for all his school life and said of his sponsorship "If it had not been for SIFT I would never have been able to study at Verbo and maybe never even studied at all".

Once he finishes school he intends to go to university to study to be a teacher. He already gets plenty of teaching practice because he helps local children who are struggling with their studies by holding classes for 15 children in a neighbour's home. He is very dedicated to teaching them what he has been taught at school and covers a variety of subjects. I was able to attend one of the lessons during my trip and it was wonderful to see that not only is José benefiting from his sponsorship but that he is also passing on his knowledge to his friends and neighbours.
